<u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> Tote Board Social Service Fund (TBSSF)

1. How are programmes selected for TBSSF funding?

The TBSSF focuses on supporting social service programmes for vulnerable families, children and youth, seniors, persons with disabilities and persons with mental health conditions.

2. What are some examples of programmes that the TBSSF funds?

Three examples of programmes that the TBSSF funds are Early Intervention (EI) programmes, Family Service Centres (FSC) and School Social Work.

El programmes support children with developmental needs. Children with mild developmental needs are supported in their preschools through the Development Support (DS) and Learning Support (LS) programmes. Children with moderate to severe developmental needs are supported through the Early Intervention Programme for Infants and Children (EIPIC), at El centres. From July this year, El centres will progressively offer enhanced El programmes that are better tailored to the different needs of children as they develop over time.

Family Service Centres (FSCs) are community-based social work entities that support low-income and/or vulnerable families with needs and risk factors that require social work intervention, to help them achieve independence, stability and resilience.

School Social Work programmes support youths who are at-risk of school disengagement, by partnering schools, families and communities to facilitate positive school outcomes for these youths.

3. How has TBSSF's funding differed over the years since its inception?

The annual amount allocated by the TBSSF has increased from about \$23m in FY06, to about \$114m in FY18.

4. How many have benefited from the TBSSF's funding support?

In the FY16-18 Tranche, the TBSSF benefited more than 87,300 beneficiaries annually, such as vulnerable families, children and youth, seniors, persons with disabilities and persons with mental health conditions.

Annex B

Frequently Asked Questions

Social Service Tripartite Taskforce (STT)

1. Who are the members of the STT? How were they selected?

The members of the STT will be appointed in the first half of 2019, and will reflect a good mix of representation from the industry, academia and the Government. Details will be shared at a later date.

2. What will the Taskforce be working on?

The STT will leverage its tripartite setup to coordinate and drive skills development initiatives for the sector. Potential projects include a review of current training courses to ensure alignment with the newly launched Skills Framework for Social Service, and other collaborative efforts that strengthen manpower development for various professions in the sector. As the projects will be ground-up initiatives coordinated and driven by members, details of specific projects will be available after the formation of the STT.
