

According to the Supervision Guidelines put forth by the Social Work Accreditation and Advisory Board (SWAAB), Social Work Supervision is a process whereby a social work trained supervisor helps supervisees develop:





Professional identity



The ultimate goal of social work supervision is to enable social workers to provide effective service to clients.

FUNCTION OF SOCIAL WORK SUPERVISION



EDUCATIONAL

The function of supervision is to develop the competency and confidence of social workers

Supervisors will help workers understand where and how social work values and ethics are applied to their case to enhance their practice, knowledge, skills and attitudes

This allows for continuous learning and for the assessment of learning and training needs



SUPPORTIVE

Supervision sessions provide a space for social workers to work through reactions and emotions that may affect their job performance and professional efficacy

Supportive supervision includes providing emotional support, enabling, empowering and helping social workers to identify situations in which self-care or external personal support may be required



ADMINISTRATIVE

Supervisors set work goals and objectives, manage workload, and evaluate supervisee's work and ensure that service standards are met
