5 steps to solving your ethical problems

## 1. SUMMARISE

- What is the problem?
- What tells you it is a problem?
- Why is it a problem?
- When is it a problem?

## 2. WHOSE DILEMMA?

### A. Decide whose responsibility the issue belongs to.

- Does the responsibility belong to the social worker, the client or both?
- What actions are needed and who is responsible?
- Should the client refuse to take action, is the worker then responsible?
  - B. Consult your supervisor



# 3. ETHICAL & LEGAL GUIDELINES

### A. Consider legal implications

- What are the legal implications?
- What action is required to be performed by law?
- Is there mandatory reporting of offences?



#### B. Examine the Code of Ethics

These rules take precedence over the worker's personal value system.

- Also consider SASW code of ethics
- Classify which ethical principle it conflicts with

If one or more rules apply



Follow the Code

If code does not address problem or is conflicting

# 4. ACTIONS TO CONSIDER

1. If more than one ethical principle conflicts, we use the EPS to guide.

# 5. TAKE ACTION & REVIEW

### UNIVERSALITY

- Would you recommend such decisions to others?
- If others recommend these decisions to you, would you accept it?

After making a decision, to ensure it is sound, consider the following:

#### **PUBLICITY**

- Why do you choose that course of action?
- Would you be willing to have your actions and rationale exposed to public scrutiny?

### **JUSTICE**

- Would you do the same for similar situations?
- Would you do the same if client was well-known or influential?

#### Review and evaluate

- Was the outcome as you hoped?
- Have you considered all factors with the result that no new factors emerged after your actions were implemented?
- Would you do the same again in similar circumstances?

Document the decision & outcome.
